Lesson 1: Noting Significant Details

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- Note significant details.
- Identify the elements of literary texts.
- Use appropriate facial expressions, body, movements or gestures.

DEVELOPMENTAL ACTIVITIES

Preparatory Activities

- 1. Routinely Activities
 - Prayer and checking of attendance.
- 2. Review (suggestions only)
 - Introduce self and get to know the students.
- 3. Motivation (suggestions only)
 - Ask the students what they know about figure of speech.

Presentation of Lesson

Discuss the lesson using the **iPresentation** resource found within the interactive courseware to facilitate the learning on **PAGES 2-7**. Give the students some practice exercise or questions.

GENERALIZATION

Lead the students in identifying that:

- Noting details is an important skill that helps students like you to be able to perform more difficult comprehension skill like summarizing and paraphrasing.
- Significant details can be details that reflects a character, tell a story and main idea or a dialogue of the characters in the story.
- Characters, setting, events, sequence, plot are the different elements of the story.
- Your facial expressions, gestures, posture, and tone of voice are powerful communication tools.

- Infer the meaning of unfamiliar words (compound) based on given context clues (synonyms, antonyms, word parts) and other strategies.
- Infer the theme of literary text.
- Summarize narrative texts based on elements—Theme, Setting, Characters (Heroes and Villains), Plot (beginning, middle and ending).

DEVELOPMENTAL ACTIVITIES

Preparatory Activities

- 1. Routinely Activities
 - Prayer and checking of attendance.
- 2. Review (suggestions only)
 - Ask the students what they learned on the previous topic Volunteer Work.
- 3. Motivation (suggestions only)
 - Discuss the context clues and compound word.
 - Ask the students to give examples of compound word.

Presentation of Lesson

Discuss the lesson using the **iPresentation** resource found within the interactive courseware to facilitate the learning on **PAGES 8-14**. Give the students some practice exercise or questions.

GENERALIZATION

Lead the students in identifying that:

- Context clues are used to unravel the meaning of an unfamiliar word through pieces of information offered within the text.
- Compound word is made up of two words.
- Synonyms are words whose meanings are nearly or exactly the same as a word.
- Antonyms are words whose meanings are the opposite of a given word.
- A literary theme is the main idea or underlying meaning a writer explores in a novel, short story, or other literary work.
- Infer means to make a conclusion based on the evidence from the story or stories that you read.
